

# Prairies Need People Submitted by Michelle Biodrowski

In August of 2020, a grassroots partnership of three different organizations (Loess Hills Preservation Society, Iowa Prairie Network, and Pottawattamie County Conservation), worked together to gain and use grant funds from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, to hire five conservation stewards from the Conservation Corps of Iowa. This conservation crew worked at Vincent Bluff State Preserve, a remnant prairie in Council Bluffs, for 40 hours cutting and treating the autumn olive and oriental bittersweet that are quickly degrading the habitat.

This project is an example of how we, as prairie enthusiasts, can be stewards of the places we love. When we protect and manage remnant populations, such as Vincent Bluff, we are sustaining a stronghold for all the species that have survived. From these remnants, we have the opportunity to learn a great deal about the diverse and vastly complex interdependencies we are erasing from the Earth. Prairies need people to care and to look after them. Prairies need YOU!

We humans have pushed prairies to the edge of existence, and they are now facing a very real possibility of extinction. We must be the guardians of the last bastions of remnant plant communities by actively managing them to hold back the never-ending tide of invasive plants, trees, and housing developments. Prairies need humans now more than ever. YOU can help. Bring a friend to a prairie to give them a chance to experience its complex beauty, volunteer at a prairie workday, be an advocate for native plant communities and the policies that protect them, donate to a non-profit working hard to protect biodiversity, share your time and talents!

## IPN's Region Revision

You may have noticed that we recently updated the IPN regions, but you might be wondering "Why did IPN do this?". Well, we updated the regions to better reflect the landforms of Iowa.

The regions now approximately line up with the landform map of Iowa.

**Region 1** is the Northwest Iowa Plains, accented by rolling hills and tallgrass prairies.

**Region 2** is the Des Moines Lobe, which is accented by prairie potholes.

Region 3 is the Iowan Surface, a landform unique to Iowa!


**Region 4** is a combination of the Iowan Surface, Paleozoic Plateau and the East-Central Drift Plain, areas of Iowa largely untouched by past glaciation.

**Region 5** combines the Loess Hills, Missouri Alluvial Plain, and Southern Iowa Drift Plain, the Loess Hills being a special landscape of Iowa.

**Regions 6 & 7** are both in the Southern Iowa Drift Plain, which is a landscape that has not been glaciated recently and is accented with rolling hills and prairies.

These new regions did result in changes to some region boundaries. However, the new regions better reflect lowa's landscape, geology, and prairies. We hope that these new regions will serve as ways to foster education on lowa's landscapes and prairies at future meetings, outreach events, and in the newsletter.
