2019 Sílent Auction Proceeds Recipient

For the past 20 years, proceeds from the Region 5 Winter Seminar silent auction have been donated to support prairie restoration projects across the state of Iowa. So far, \$101,334 have been contributed to internships, scholarships, management projects, and land purchase assistance. The 2019 proceeds went toward the protection and purchase of the Hargroves II property in Monona County, in partnership with the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation (INHF) and Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

INHF recently purchased 162 acres of land in Monona County with the intention of transferring it to the Iowa DNR for public use. This potential addition to the Loess Hills Wildlife Management Area (WMA) is located in the Turin Special Landscape Area and lies just a mile from the east boundary of the DNR's Loess Hills WMA. The parcel contains classic loess hills topography, scenic vistas, bur oak woodlands, high-quality native prairie, and restorable native prairie.

What is unique about this property?

The property contains a mix of very high-quality remnant loess hills prairie, restorable loess hills prairie enrolled in the Grassland Reserve Program (GRP), and row-crop fields (all enrolled in CRP), and bur oak woodlands. Restoration potential of the remnant prairie found on the knolls and steep slopes is excellent.

Why is it significant?

The more than 100 acres of remnant prairie is significant along with all the crop fields now in native vegetation, in helping to protect water quality in the area. The property is approximately 1 mile from the Iowa DNR's Loess Hills WMA, which is over 2,700 acres. It is also located in the Loess Hills Bird Conservation Area (BCA) and is important habitat for species like the grasshopper sparrow and western meadowlark.

Future of the property

INHF currently owns the property, but is partnering with the Iowa DNR to secure funding and eventually transfer the property to their ownership. The property will be open to the public following the transfer. IPN is pleased to be partnering with INHF and Iowa DNR in this endeavor.

Burning Questions

What are those shiny green beetle bugs in my garden? What kind of bird is that? Why should I put native plants in my yard? What can I do to help improve pollinator populations? Where's the nearest public prairie? Will prairie plants grow in moist or shady areas? What is the difference between weeds and wildflowers? Are there any native trees or shrubs I can add to my landscape? Do I need lots of land to start a prairie planting? How do wetlands help the environment? Who can I contact to learn more about native ecosystems, wildlife, or plant species?

If you have ever asked yourself any of these questions then Iowa Prairie Network is for you. IPN is a network of professional conservationists, self-taught naturalists, various specialists, and government and non-government organizations across the state that can help you find the answers to your burning questions about our natural heritage and how you can contribute to its preservation and restoration.



Eddyville Sand Dunes Prairie

If you are looking for a unique prairie experience, the Eddyville Sand Dunes Prairie should be on your list of must-see prairies in Iowa. Located just outside of Eddyville, this 225 acre natural area includes dry sand prairie, wetland, and woodlands, and is home to some species of plants and wildlife that are rare to Iowa, such as prickly pear cactus, ornate box turtles, and 6-lined racerunner lizards.

A stroll along the 1.4 mile trail leads you through each of these valuable ecosystems. While every season possesses its own beauty and wonder, early June is when you'll find the prickly pear in bloom, as well as hoary puccoon and many others. Do yourself a favor – pack a picnic, grab the family, and head out to the Dunes to drink in this rare experience.
